

<p style="text-align: center;"><b>THE DAPHNE III PROGRAMME (2007-2013) TO PREVENT AND COMBAT VIOLENCE AGAINST CHILDREN, YOUNG PEOPLE AND WOMEN AND TO PROTECT VICTIMS AND GROUPS AT RISK.</b></p>
---

**CALL FOR PROPOSALS JLS/DAP/2007-1 (SPECIFIC TRANSNATIONAL PROJECTS)**

This call for proposals aims at selecting specific projects to be co-funded by the European Commission. The projects are anticipated to begin from the second half of 2008 and will have a duration of either 12 or 24 months.

Only new projects will be eligible for support; projects that have already begun will not be eligible for co-financing.

**1. OBJECTIVES OF THE DAPHNE III PROGRAMME**

The **general objective** of the Daphne III Programme is to contribute to the protection of children, young people and women against all forms of violence and to attain a high level of health protection, well being and social cohesion. The programme shall contribute, especially where it concerns children, young people and women, to the development of the Community policies and more specifically to those related to public health, human rights and gender equality, as well as actions aimed at protection of children's rights, and the fight against trafficking of human beings and sexual exploitation.

The programme's **specific objective** is to contribute to the prevention of and the fight against all forms of violence occurring in the public or the private domain against children, young people and women, including sexual exploitation and trafficking in human beings, by taking preventive measures and by providing support and protection for victims and groups at risk.

This specific objective will be achieved by means of the following actions:

- (a) assisting and encouraging NGOs and other organisations active in this field;
- (b) developing and implementing awareness-raising actions targeting specific audiences, such as specific professions, competent authorities, identified sectors of the general public and groups at risk, with a view both to improving understanding of and promoting the adoption of zero tolerance towards violence, and to encouraging support for victims and the reporting of incidences of violence to the competent authorities;
- (c) disseminating the results obtained under the previous two Daphne programmes including their adaptation, transfer and use by other beneficiaries or in other geographical areas;
- (d) identifying and enhancing actions contributing to positive treatment of people at risk of violence, namely following an approach that encourages respect for them and promotes their well-being and self-fulfilment;
- (e) setting up and supporting multidisciplinary networks with a view to strengthening cooperation between NGOs and other organisations active in this field;

- (f) ensuring the expansion of evidence-based information and the knowledge base, the exchange, identification and dissemination of information and good practice, including through research, training, study visits and staff exchange;
- (g) designing and testing awareness-raising and educational materials regarding the prevention of violence against children, young people and women, and supplementing and adapting those already available for use in other geographical areas or for other target groups;
- (h) studying phenomena related to violence and its impact, both on victims and on society as a whole, including the health-care, social and economic costs, in order to address the root causes of violence at all levels of society;
- (i) developing and implementing support programmes for victims and people at risk and intervention programmes for perpetrators, whilst ensuring the safety of victims.

## **2. 2007 PRIORITY AREAS**

All projects submitted must fulfil both the general and the specific objectives of the Daphne III Programme and will be evaluated against the criteria set forth in Section 6 (see below).

In 2007, the European Commission is seeking proposals for projects that address the priority areas described in this call. Applicants should be clear which of these priority categories their proposal addresses.

Projects submitted outside these priority areas will be considered but only where they clearly do not duplicate actions already taken or being taken, and demonstrate innovation and are clearly European in scope.

All projects submitted must be within the scope of the programme and will be evaluated against the criteria set for this call for proposals.

### **The priority areas for 2007 will be:**

#### **I. Treatment programmes for perpetrators of violence against children, young people and women**

- mapping of existing research and programming of treatment programmes for perpetrators of violence in Europe including comparative qualitative and quantitative assessments of their impact and recommendations for future directions in this area at national and European levels;
- exchange, capacity building and transfer of knowledge in the area of treatment programmes for perpetrators of violence.

#### **II. National legislation in Europe relating to violence**

- mapping of existing legislation in all Member States of the EU, as well as in the EFTA, Candidate and Western Balkans States relating to any form of violence against children, young people and/or women; the results should be presented in a form that can be both easily updated and widely circulated and should also include recommendations at European level on future directions for legislation at EU-level relating to violence;
- analysis of the impact and effectiveness of national legislation on violence and its enforcement;

- exchange of experiences and lessons relating to legislation and its enforcement, designed to build the capacity of practitioners in the law enforcement, judicial and para-legal fields and to propose practical recommendations for reform and enhanced enforcement.

### **III. Targeted awareness raising, education and information**

- targeted awareness raising campaigns and information activities designed to sensitise specific groups to the harmful effects of violence, with a view to encouraging attitudes and behaviours of zero tolerance to violence in all its forms;
- targeted education and information actions designed to increase awareness and understanding of laws and policies relating to violence, avenues for reporting violence and for seeking support and redress;
- in view of 2007 being the *European Year of Equal Opportunities for All*: clearly targeted education and information actions designed to reinforce understanding of the particularly harmful effects of discrimination and stereotyping (based on gender, age, ethnicity, physical attributes, sexual orientation, socio-economic status, disability etc.);
- development and testing of in-service training packages on the scope, nature and impact of violence with a view to increasing the capacity of those working with at-risk children, young people, women and families to prevent violence and protect them from it .

### **IV. Studies, mapping and research**

- Quantitative and qualitative research and studies on violence against children and young people in sports and recreational communities, with recommendations on prevention strategies and mobilization and capacity building of those who can influence behaviours within these communities;
- Quantitative and qualitative research on the scope and nature of child sexual abuse and exploitation in Europe in the ten years after the first World Congress against Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children and the launch of the Daphne Programme;
- Mapping and analysis of trends in (i) legislation, (ii) data collection, (iii) framework policies and structures and/or (iv) victim support services for children, adolescents and women who have experienced sexual abuse or exploitation, or who have been trafficked;
- Surveys of existing initiatives to support victims of trafficking, honour-related crimes and forced marriage, and evidence-based identification of good practice with a view to recommending future actions at national and European levels;
- Research on violence against older women in Europe with a view to shedding light on the nature of such violence, vulnerability profiles of victims, underlying causes, categories of perpetrators, risk factors, current responses and gaps in legislation/support. The study should recommend future action at national and European levels in this area.

### **V. Indicators and related data collection**

In order to contribute to improve statistical surveying of violence, harmonized and comparable data collection, the call will give priority to the development of indicators and related data collection in the areas of:

- violence against children in the home and family;
- violence against children, young people and women living and/or working on the streets;
- violence against children and young people in schools and educational establishments.

#### **VI. Extraction of policy issues from work achieved by Daphne-funded projects**

Based on the experiences of Daphne-funded projects, the Programme can contribute to the development of policy at local, national and/or European levels. Priority will be given to studies extracting policy issues in the areas of:

- violence against women working in the sex sector, including women in situations of forced labour and/or trafficking;
- violence against migrant adolescents and/or women in the workplace/work environment.

#### **VII. Exchange, adaptation and use of existing good practices**

It is expected that projects submitted in this category of action will demonstrate how the 'good practice' has been evaluated and identified, and will cover most, if not all, of the Member States. Priority will be given to projects aiming to:

- develop, adapt and implement existing training packages developed under Daphne;
- provide capacity-building and sharing of expertise relating to 'good parenting' and the encouragement of non-violent relationships within the family, especially for families at risk;
- provide capacity-building, exchange of information and sharing of expertise aimed at preventing the abuse, neglect and maltreatment of babies and infants of pre-school age.

### **3. WHO CAN APPLY?**

#### **LEGAL STATUS:**

The Daphne III Programme is open to participation by non-profit private organisations and public authorities and institutions (local authorities at the competent level, university departments and research centres). Please note that public bodies at national/central level are not eligible for Daphne funding. Profit-making organisations may be accepted as partners if justified by the nature of the action.

Participating organisations must show in their application that they have experience in working to:

- Prevent and combat violence against children, young people and women **or**;
- Protect against such violence; or to provide support for victims **or** ;
- Implement targeted actions to promote rejection of such violence or to encourage attitude and behaviour change towards vulnerable groups and victims of violence.

## **ORIGIN:**

Organisations from the 27 Member States of the EU are eligible for action grant funding under the programme.

Organisations from all other countries may participate as associate partners but will not be eligible for community funding.

NOTE: For reasons external to the European Commission, organisations from the EFTA/EEA countries (Iceland, Liechtenstein and Norway) are not eligible for funding under the JLS/DAP/2007-1 call for proposals.

The Programme is also open to the participation of organisations from candidate countries associated to the EU and the Western Balkan countries, but specific conditions for these countries must first be met before they can be funded (i.e.: these countries must have signed a memorandum of understanding in order to participate in the Programme and must have contributed to the Budget of the European Communities).

## **PARTNERSHIP:**

Proposals must have a partnership of at least two eligible organisations from two different EU Member States.

- In each partnership, an **‘Applicant’** (coordinating organisation or lead organisation) must be chosen. This Applicant will submit the proposal for the Commission’s appraisal. The Applicant will be legally responsible for managing the project, coordinating all tasks, liaising with the Commission and managing the budget (**the "Beneficiary"**).
- **‘Partners’** are those organisations participating in the implementation of project activities that are eligible for funding (from EU Member States). Once the grant agreement has been signed, each partner will be considered as a **co-beneficiary** and will sign a mandate to assign full legal responsibility to the co-ordinating organisation. The co-ordinating organisation will receive funds from the Commission and will distribute them among the co-beneficiaries;
- **‘Associate Partners’** are those organisations participating in the project on a non-funded basis.

An applicant may apply for support for several separate projects. In this case, separate applications should be submitted. Only one application per project is permitted. Applicants may also participate as partners (co-beneficiaries) in projects submitted by other organisations. In case more than one project is selected for funding, the applicant must demonstrate its technical and financial capacities to implement all of its selected projects.

All other organisations in the partnership, i.e. ‘Partners (co-beneficiaries)’ and ‘Associate Partners’ must complete and sign a partnership declaration, which must be included as part of the application.

#### **4. BUDGET AND FINANCIAL ASPECTS**

In 2007, the indicative budget available for specific projects is EUR 11 million. The Commission's contribution towards a single project in any 12-month period cannot be less than EUR 75,000 nor greater than EUR 200,000. The Commission will determine the amounts of financial assistance to be awarded, based on the available budget.

The Community's financial contribution may not exceed 80 per cent of the total direct eligible costs of the action in any 12-month period. Each applicant will therefore have to secure complementary funding from other sources to cover the balance of the project costs.

A minimum of 20 per cent of the total eligible costs must therefore be provided as a cash contribution, either from the applicant organisation and/or partners (co-beneficiaries), or from another donor source. This complementary funding must be secured and demonstrated in the application.

Contributions in kind are not accountable in the co-financed amount and are not taken into account in the calculation of the EC co-funding.

Project funding is based on the principle of shared costs. If the amount awarded by the Commission is lower than the amount requested by the applicant, it is the responsibility of the applicant to find the additional amount required or to reduce the total cost of the project.

Selected projects will begin as soon as the grant agreement is signed by both parties. No expenditure is eligible before the starting date of the grant agreement.

An advance payment of 70 per cent of the Commission's contribution will be paid within 45 days of the countersignature of the grant agreement. The balance will be paid once the Commission has accepted the final report and financial accounts.

At the time of payment of the balance, the amount granted will be proportionate to the eligible costs of the project and will be reduced proportionally where the total eligible costs turn out to be lower than the total estimated costs.

Sums due shall be paid within no more than forty-five calendar days by the Commission. On expiry of the time-limit, the creditor shall be entitled to late payment interest.

Commission grants are attributed for non-commercial purposes only and projects must be strictly non-profit making.

In addition, applicants should submit the following supporting documents, if they exist:

- Certificate of legal registration of applicant organisation;
- List of members of the Board of Directors or executive officers;
- Annual technical/narrative report of the applicant organisation for the previous year;
- Most recent audit report by independent authorised firm of auditors.

## **6. CRITERIA APPLICABLE FOR ACTION GRANT SELECTION**

### **EXCLUSION CRITERIA**

Potential applicants and partners (co-beneficiaries) may not participate in calls for proposals or be awarded grants if they are in any of the situations:

- (a) they are bankrupt or being wound up, are having their affairs administered by the court, have entered into an arrangement with creditors, have suspended business activities, are the subject of proceedings concerning those matters, or are in any analogous situation arising from a similar procedure provided for in national legislation or regulations;
- (b) they have been convicted of an offence concerning their professional conduct by a judgement which has the force of *res judicata*;
- (c) they have been guilty of grave professional misconduct proven by any means which the contracting authority can justify;
- (d) they have not fulfilled obligations relating to the payment of social security contributions or the payment of taxes in accordance with the legal provisions of the country in which they are established or with those of the country of the contracting authority or those of the country where the contract is to be performed;
- (e) they have been the subject of a judgement which has the force of *res judicata* for fraud, corruption, involvement in a criminal organisation or any other illegal activity detrimental to the Communities' financial interests;
- (f) they are currently subject to an administrative penalty imposed by the contracting authority on (i) applicants which are guilty of misrepresentation in supplying the information required by the contracting authority as a condition of participation in the grant application procedure or fail to supply this information; or (ii) contractors who have been declared to be in serious breach of their obligations under contracts covered by the budget.

### **ELIGIBILITY CRITERIA**

Proposals will be declared ineligible if they do not respect one of the following criteria. If a grant application is declared ineligible, it will not be considered for evaluation.

- (a) The grant application must have been submitted by the deadline set for the call;
- (b) The applicant and each partner (co-beneficiary) and associate partner must be eligible to participate in the Daphne III Programme (legal status and country of origin);
- (c) The original of the grant application form submitted to the Commission must have been signed by the legal representative of the applicant organisation;
- (d) All of the required annexes must be attached to the grant application form;

- (e) The Community grant applied for must be lower or equal to **80%** of the total eligible cost of the project and be between EUR **75,000** and **200,000** for any 12-month period;
- (f) The applicant must have provided written proof, through the signed budget form, the Partner Declaration(s) and Co-financing Declaration(s), that it has secured co-financing of at least **20%** of the total eligible cost of the project.

## SELECTION CRITERIA

The following criteria will be evaluated for all eligible proposals:

- (a) The grant application must describe a project that satisfies the general and specific objectives of the Daphne III Programme;
- (b) The project co-ordinator (i.e.: the applicant organisation) must have sufficient operational, financial and professional capacity to manage and complete the project;
- (c) The proposed budget must be sufficiently detailed to allow for an assessment of all individual costs. The budget must be commensurate with the activities of the project. It should show that the grant requested is the minimum necessary for completing the project.

## AWARD CRITERIA

The proposals meeting the selection criteria will be the subject of an in-depth evaluation that aims to rate response to the following 35 questions, with a maximum number of points to be allocated under each criterion as indicated below:

Once the evaluation procedure is completed, including receipt of the Programme Committee's opinion and the Commission's decision, the Commission will inform each applicant of the final decision taken, including reasons for rejection, and of the next steps. The Commission will then set in motion the procedures necessary for preparation of the grant agreement (including dialogue with the applicant concerning any necessary technical and financial adjustments as well as procedures relating to expenditure commitments).
